Membership in the Council for Museum Anthropology has remained fairly consistent. While membership is down nearly 10% from our recent high of 375 in November 2011, it is down only 1% from a year previous. A decrease in dues for student members (only \$5 per year) was enacted in 2013, but was not fully advertised (the AAA website was only recently corrected for the change), so we expect to attract more student members in coming years.

CMA's 2013 publication budget for Museum Anthropology is \$11,800. The 2014 budget will be \$10,700.

CMA's Net Assets as of the end of November 2013 stood at more than \$76,000. The CMA membership has approved the transfer of \$35,000 of this into two quasi-endowments that will support Student Travel Awards, the Ames Prize, and the CMA Lifetime Achievement Award.

The Council has benefited from favorable returns from the Wiley-Blackwell publishing contract. Through the creation of the quasi-endowments and other actions, the Council is working to ensure continued sustainable budgets going into the future.

The CMA membership meets only once per year, at the AAA Meetings in the fall. The CMA Board does, however, conduct business throughout the year, on an as-needed basis, by communicating via email.

Mentorship:

CMA plays a significant role in linking the museum anthropology community together, nationally and internationally. We actively encourage student members and have agreed to have an elected student board member. We have maintained close links with Smithsonian Institute for Museum Anthropology, a National Science Foundation sponsored summer program for graduate students interested in researching museum collections. In planning our annual reception we make sure that we link in with the local musuem community and whereever possible co-spost the event. We encourage our members to develop sessions that cover important topics for the museum profession in general. The internship programs that museums offer are a particularly good way of engaging young scholars in the discipline and

open up career possibilities.

Early career scholars.

We have a relatively young board and actively encourage the participation of early career scholars in our programs.

Independent scholars.

Museum anthropology attracts independent scholars who follow up personal interests thorugh becoming involved in museums as volunteers which often allows them to pursue their scholarly interests. This may be an area in which CMA could become more engaged.

Outreach:

Additional outreach efforts (at or beyond the AAA meetings) to other sections, interest groups, and scholarly societies, government agencies, public education/community engagement, and underrepresented minorities.

The issue of outreach has been covered in other sections. We have close links with SVA and have a history of cooperating with other sections. Museums are an important portal for community engagement and perhaps should be used more in communicating anthropological knowledge broadly defined to different audiences and interest groups. We work closely with the Smithsonian and other museums in developing programs and in many ways CMA provides a fulcrum for museum anthropology on a global basis, which means that it links in with the wider museum community. CMA has significant minority representation on its board and through its membership, but equally importantly engages with minorities through its programs. Our Journal fulfils a major role internationally. There are no equivalents.

2013 CMA membership vote on By-laws:

A bylaw change was adopted that revised the duties and responsibilities of the Past President, by allowing the Past President to serve as an advisor and Ex Officio member of the CMA Board for two years after retirement, thus providing a smoother transition.

Additional Board Positions open in 2014:

CMA is now soliciting nominations for four positions to be elected in 2014: three CMA Board Members-at-Large, and one designated CMA Student Board Member.

Initiatives:

What Initiatives does your Section have underway or planned for the coming year: membership, publication annual meeting, mentorship, other?

We have an excellent and active board and our strategy over the next year is to increase our engagement with our constituency. In order to achieve this we have improved our communications and our Facebook page is beginning to attract an enthusiastic response. We need to attract more students and volunteers as members. We also need to engage more with anthropology in Europe, where a much more positive relationship has developed between anthropology and museums than is the case in the USA. The President of CMA is convening a session of the decennial conference of the ASA in Edinburgh this June as a step in that direction.

Museums are one of the most important portals for anthropological engagement with the public. We need to use our position to better advantage, and to get our colleagues to understand the importance of such engagements. We have, for example, formed strong collaborations with SVA, which is another section that presents great opportunities for outreach.

We are considering creating a joint session on materiality at the next AAA conference, led by CMA and SVA, to emphasize the role that material culture continues to play in anthropological research. We need to engage more with the discourse on materiality from the perspective of museums, scholars, and communities who engage with the issues in tangible ways through various collections and initiatives.

We also need to have a stronger engagement with source communities. Museum anthropologists are playing a crucial role in the reengagement of peoples with their material heritage, and are beginning to develop a more nuanced understanding of the motivations of those who helped to create the major ethnographic collections. Experiences in Australia, Europe, Canada and increasingly the USA are beginning to show a very different kind of engagement between museum anthropology and indigenous communities, in which collections and archives are seen to be a major resource in the present. CMA needs to be part of that movement as a portal for the positive engagement of indigenous communities with the resources from anthropology's past. That should be one of our greatest strengths.
